OPENING PRAYER

Almighty God and Heavenly Father,

We come before you in a time of global crisis. But as we do, we are reminded you are God of the Nations; 'The LORD blesses each nation that worships only him. He blesses his chosen ones.' (Psalm 33:12, CEV).

Despite our current situation, we celebrate your goodness and offer our worship. We come in quiet confidence that no situation is outside your control, nor need we fear or panic; but rather trust in your total care and provision.

We choose now to set aside the affairs of our world and come to you in worship.

We long to be together as your Church but understand that is not physically possible at the present time. Help us to be patient.

We humbly ask that your power and presence calm our fears and anxieties, and please be with us each one, as we engage with your Word, in prayer, and in song.

In Jesus' name and to your glory through the power of the Holy Spirit,

Focusing Psalm: Psalm 46:1-11

¹God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. ²Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea. ³ though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging. Selah ⁴ There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy place where the Most High dwells. ⁵God is within her, she will not fall; God will help her at break of day. ⁶Nations are in uproar, kingdoms fall; he lifts his voice, the earth melts. ⁷ The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress. Selah ⁸ Come and see what the LORD has done, the desolations he has brought on the earth. ⁹He makes wars cease to the ends of the earth; he breaks the bow and shatters the spear; he burns the shields with fire. ¹⁰He says, "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." ¹¹The LORD Almighty is with us;

the God of Jacob is our fortress.

Points to note:

(This Psalm was written by the Sons of Korah (temple assistants) and its theme is God's constant help, refuge, security, and peace.)

The earth giving way (vs. 2) is something we have all felt with the earthquakes in Canterbury, but even in the face of utter destruction the Psalmist maintained confidence in God's ability to save.

Throughout history cities and even civilisations have been established around rivers. A nearby fresh water source makes habitation and agriculture possible.

Interestingly, Jerusalem – the City of God – had no major river but the Psalmist likened God's ever-flowing provision to being like a river (vs. 4 & 5). Living away from that source and provision (e.g. idolatry) made the city vulnerable to enemies, and in the case of Jerusalem, being sacked and the people taken into captivity in Babylon (586 BC).

Verse 7 is repeated in verse 11 and the repetition underscores God's promise and provision.

We know the first line of verse 10 well. Our world is full of unrelenting distraction and often loud noise. Stillness and silence allow space for God to enter into our quiet.

Selah is a Hebrew word which adds emphasis and praise to the points (an intensifier).

Critics often 'blame' God for starting wars; but these are always a manifestation of sin, greed, and selfish desire. God brings peace and final victory (v.9)

I Listening: Crown him with many crowns: *This is a stirring rendition of a favourite hymn with full orchestration – enjoy!*

Heavenly Father,

Thank you for the privilege of praying for others. Firstly, however, we pause to consider the things in our lives that could hinder our prayers. We name them before you – the wilful and unintentional sins and the sins of neglect (pause and name what comes to mind). Forgive us; cleanse us and wash us clean. Thank you that through the Lord Jesus and his righteousness we can come before you, confess our sins and shortcomings, and pray with confidence, according to your will and know that you hear us.

We pray for a world in crisis and ask that the Coronavirus be contained and lives spared. For those who are ill; please heal them. Thank you for those working to provide care and relief. May your grace protect and keep them and your healing power work through their skills. We pray for churches worldwide that they will be creative and effective in reaching out to their communities. May every leader be given insight and wisdom as they lead, and encourage others to serve, and show practical love. This pandemic shatters the idol of selfsufficiency and all the things in our lives that are attractive but can never save us. How easily we ignore your ways and pursue our own lives and agendas. Lord, have mercy on everyone affected by this virus and may much good come ultimately out of this situation.

We pray for our own nation and government. May all in authority and leadership; the Prime Minister, MPs, mayors, city councillors, and other decision makers be led by your Spirit even if they are unaware of it. May their decisions genuinely help and serve others. Give them your mind and surround them with godly people who will exercise integrity and work for justice, morality, freedom, and peace. Help them to esteem you, not dismiss you. May the present situation bring about a new spirit of unity in our nation.



Listening: 'Lord have Mercy'

A Time of quiet reflection

Song: 'Bless the Lord' ('10,000 reasons') 🧖

This lovely song of worship is based on Psalm 103. The lyrics express the need for constant praise to God for all that He is, from our first breath to our last. As it was for the Psalmists who often faced uncertainty and affliction, we too, should be a worshipping people.

Hymn: 'It is well with my soul'

Another old favourite. This is a powerful version complete with inspirational graphics.

Song: 'I stand amazed - how marvellous, how wonderful' *And one more... I couldn't resist this – one we know so well at Hoon Hay! This is a contemporary version of a song with profound lyrics and promises for us at this time of crisis. God bless you this week!*
