
HOON HAY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

¹² as far as the east is from the west, so far has he removed our transgressions from us.


¹³ As a father has compassion on his children, so the LORD has compassion on those who fear him;

PASTOR'S REFLECTION

This week I want to reflect on the Sovereign's (Queen Elizabeth's) birthday, which as you may know, was on April 21, when the Queen has reached the grand old age of 94. My own mother was born just five days later in the same year (1926) and she was always a keen supporter of the Queen and felt some connection with her. Whatever we think of the Queen or the monarchy itself, we must admire Elizabeth's calm, collected leadership and consistency across decades and scores of international, national, and family crises.



Many of us will have first-hand memories of the Queen on one or more of her several visits to New Zealand. The most notable was early in her reign when she and Prince Phillip visited in December 1953 and January 1954. This was the first time a reigning English monarch had visited our shores and the country put on a grand display of pomp, pageantry, and patriotic fervour. Being the height of summer, local councils were even instructed when to plant flowers along the streets the royal cavalcade would pass so they would bloom on the day! Quoting New Zealand playwright Bruce Mason, the historian Jock Phillips referred to the tour as the 'End of the Golden Weather'. It was in terms of the British Empire and fever-pitch support for the monarchy, but a scaled-down and modernised version of empire did emerge in the form of the Commonwealth.

There has been much talk in recent decades about dispensing with the monarchy and becoming a republic. It may happen, but I want to suggest we pause and consider what the English monarch stands for – and not just value the present Queen's personal qualities (impressive though these are). She understands herself and her reign as *authority before God* ('Defender of the Faith'). And, as a person of genuine Christian faith, she has a humility before God and the people ('subjects' if you prefer). She rules with respect to the higher authority of Almighty God; the God of the Scriptures. We should be thankful for that because if there is no higher authority than the state we can lose sight of accountability before God and get lured into the humanist (Promethean) belief that 'man is the measure of all things' and in turn, this has easily led to dictatorships. Authority is of God but that does not mean *all authority is godly* or that any individual is especially virtuous (this is why we should always pray for our leaders). However, when a person such as Queen Elizabeth professes faith in Christ and affirms transcendent authority, that's not only a good thing but actually a blessing!
