Kia Ora, Hello Everybody,

Welcome to another online service. Like churches everywhere we wait to see if the government will make changes allowing us to meet again at church. The rules enabling certain groups to meet but not churches will hopefully be reviewed and the restrictions lifted soon. Meanwhile, the Parish Council continues to work towards plans and policies in a post-COVID world.

I meet weekly with other ministers in the Alpine Presbytery via Zoom videoconference. These meetings have been helpful to share, support, and encourage each other as we have been in an extended period of isolation. Last week, one of the participants pointed out that for all of our churches life will not be the same as it was before the pandemic. Even if we thought things will soon get back to an 'old normal' – they won't; indeed, they can't. He went on to ask: "What's one thing you'd leave behind, and one thing you'd do differently?" That poses an interesting and important challenge. The point was also made that we will drift back to how things were unless we are intentional. One positive has been an increased and constructive use of technology, and perhaps that is something we can build upon going forward.

This week we explore the Mind in our 'Anchored in Christ' series. Along with the heart, the mind is the core of our being and also profoundly spiritual. A key to effective living is the ascended mind of Christ. We will look at what this means and its practical implications.

PASTOR'S REFLECTION

Something a little different this week! I came across this delightfully written piece which reflects on our present situation in an entertaining but still insightful manner. Titled **A Pandemic Parable** it is written by Rex Ahdar, a legal academic at Otago University, and originally published in 'The Pundit' blogsite (17 May, 2020)

And so it came pass that a great plague swept the face of all the Earth. Some say it came from the East, others say it came from gloomy caverns of the bat or jungles of the civet. From whence it came, who can say? But come it did.

In the distant kingdom the temples of the gods had fallen silent.
