Today is a special day in the life of our parish! For those who can join us, this is our first time together, on-site in 11 weeks (our last service was on 22 March just prior to the COVID-19 lockdown). In that time, like every church, we have had to re-adjust to an entirely new and unforeseen set of circumstances. No other crisis in living memory has had quite the effect the Corona virus pandemic has had on churches. SUMMARY OF KEY POINTS

'And the Spirit of the Lord Came Upon Them'

Last week Allan brought us a Pentecost Sunday message, and today we look further at the person and work of the Holy Spirit.

Although as limited, finite beings we are denied a full understanding of the Holy Spirit, we can and must understand God is Triune (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit), and all of God is involved in all of what God does. The Holy Spirit is the third member of the eternal, Triune Godhead (NB. 'third' not in a numerical/hierarchical sense, but relationally). The Spirit is of one essence with the Father and the Son. The Holy Spirit gives glory to the Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. He brings the presence and power of Christ into our everyday experience as comforter, advocate and counsellor.

The Holy Spirit was involved in creation and all through the Old Testament. At times, the Spirit came upon various individuals, e.g. Gideon (Judges 6) who was empowered to rise and defeat the Midianites. The Spirit came upon Jesus at his baptism (John 1:29-33), and note that the Spirit remained on him (v.32). Jesus received, bore, promised and sent the Spirit (John 14); first to the disciples, and later at Pentecost (Acts 2) on all believers, Jew and Gentile. The Spirit indwells every believer, but we need to 'keep in step with the Spirit' (Galatians 5:25). This implies the Spirit's work in us requires an on-going openness to his guidance.

There are several metaphors to describe the Spirit's work in Scripture: water, fire, oil, the dove, wind, dew, etc. These are useful but not fully adequate.

We cannot live the Christian life without the Holy Spirit. There is no Church without the Holy Spirit, no life, love, joy, or hope.

Questions to ponder

- **1.** Why is describing the Holy Spirit as an 'impersonal force' so wrong?
- **2.** Recall a time when you understood a profound spiritual insight. How would you describe the role and ministry of the Holy Spirit in this?

PASTOR'S REFLECTION

The lockdown has taught us many things. It was so sudden and comprehensive that it forced us all to do things differently. Everyday things like shopping became an exercise requiring almost military planning and precision, and the queues at the door resembled food shortages in an Eastern bloc nation during the Soviet era. However, I loved the peace and quiet – very few cars, quiet streets, and no planes. This atmosphere seemed to be enhanced by the still, sunny days of autumn. That 'window' between about 10:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. on such days, when it was sunny and warm, highlighted the stunning colour of the trees, and even the lengthening shadows were accentuated in the quiet. Like many others I realised how noisy and frenetic so-called 'normal' life was prior to the lockdown.

Being back together again is one of those possibly taken-for-granted activities that takes on a new meaning and purpose. The gathered people of God, the Church (*ekklesia*) is more than a Probus or Sunday Rotary club; it is divinely appointed to bring the gospel of Jesus Christ to the nations and make disciples to fulfil the Great Commission (Matthew 18). Defeating – or at least, containing – the virus is one thing; what our society will look like going forward, is another. It is not scaremongering to predict massive social and economic dislocation in the wake of COVID-19. Some pundits suggest a financial downturn much greater than the GFC (Global Financial Crisis) of 2008, and the likes of which we have not seen since the far-off days of the Great Depression in the 1930s. Already there have been significant layoffs and whole sectors of the economy are struggling. Travel and tourism, for example, may not recover for many years. And we are yet to see the knock-on effects in mental health, housing issues, and poverty, etc.

As has always been the case, Scripture locates the people of God right in the centre of worldly problems: wars, famines, droughts, etc. Israel was to be a light to the nations (Isaiah 49:6), and the early Christians had to contend with the challenges of living under oppressive Roman rule. Here at Hoon Hay, I believe we need to respond to the needs of our community with wisdom, compassion, and a deep desire to bring the love of God in fresh ways. I have been reflecting and praying about this and I invite you to as well. An interesting and possibly revealing exercise would be to place a compass on a map of our area with the centre being on our site and the arm set to represent a 5km radius (10 km area overall), and we then pray earnestly on how we could bless people in the identified area. I wonder what God would show us? Either way, we do need together to discern new ways of being God's people together (in our services), and, reaching out to our community. All the good activities need to resume and continue, but what an opportunity post-COVID to reconnect with our community!
