Listening: We listen: 'Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing'

This hymn starts by setting before us a gospel-centred model for worship, both in corporately praising God and for giving Him glory in our day-to-day lives. We are to look to what God has done for us and respond accordingly, with 'songs of loudest praise'.

# FOCUSING PSALM: PSALM 49: 1-12 (NIV)

For the director of music. Of the Sons of Korah. A psalm emphasising the futility of worldliness (riches, pride, and fame). Given our teaching focus today on Philemon, the slave owner, verse 7 is a reminder that in the ancient world a slave had to be redeemed or ransomed. There is, however, no way a person can buy eternal life. God alone can redeem us; never possessions and physical comforts.

- <sup>1</sup>Hear this, all you peoples; listen, all who live in this world,
- <sup>2</sup>both low and high, rich and poor alike:
- <sup>3</sup>My mouth will speak words of wisdom; the meditation of my heart will give you understanding.
- <sup>4</sup>I will turn my ear to a proverb; with the harp I will expound my riddle:
- <sup>5</sup>Why should I fear when evil days come, when wicked deceivers surround me—
- <sup>6</sup> those who trust in their wealth and boast of their great riches?
- <sup>7</sup>No one can redeem the life of another or give to God a ransom for them—

- 8 the ransom for a life is costly, no payment is ever enough—
- <sup>9</sup> so that they should live on forever and not see decay.
- <sup>10</sup> For all can see that the wise die, that the foolish and the senseless also perish, leaving their wealth to others.
- <sup>11</sup>Their tombs will remain their houses forever, their dwellings for endless generations, though they had named lands after themselves.
- <sup>12</sup> People, despite their wealth, do not endure; they are like the beasts that perish.

**We listen:** 'The Sweet By and By'

The composer of this hymn, Sandford F. Bennett, was inspired to write it when a friend who was given to depression said he would be 'all right by and by'. With that, the idea for the hymn was birthed and the lyrics came together in around half an hour. Mr. Bennett's friend was Joseph Webster who wrote the music. The song reminds us that the aim of our hope is to live in that land that is fairer than day; that is heaven, which is pictured as a land or country to which God's people want to go (Hebrews 11:13-16).

Central to the story of Philemon is the welfare of a redeemed slave (Onesimus). Slavery was widespread in the Roman Empire but Paul pleads Onesimus' case – just as Jesus Christ does for us before the Father. Even slaves can be set free and their 'owners' redeemed in God's love. This was the case for John Newton, the notorious slave trader, who came to faith and freedom. We know the song! This version adds slightly to the original but very sensitively.
